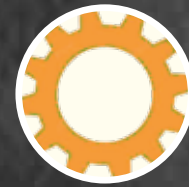

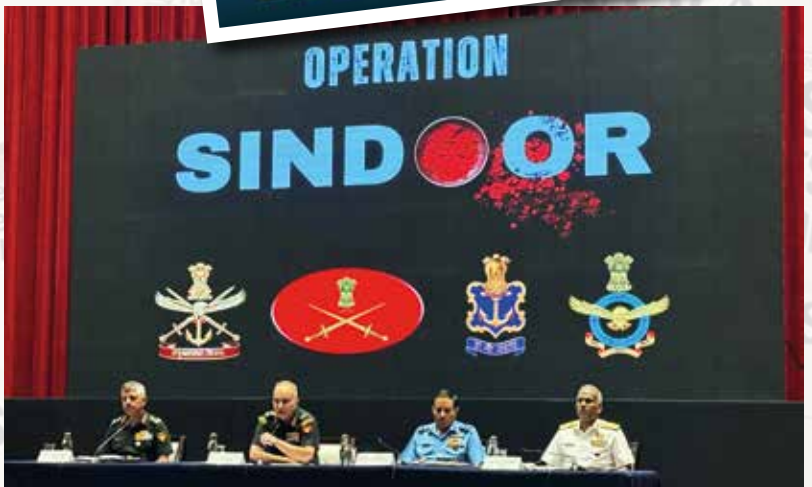
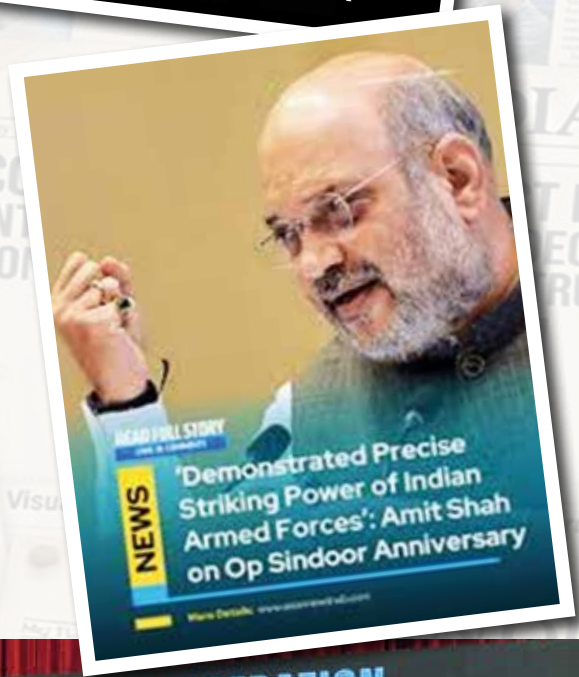

MAY 10, 2026
The 2026 India-Pakistan four-day air war — triggered after the Pulwama-like terror attack — resumed on May 10, 2026. It was the most serious military confrontation between the two nuclear-armed nations in nearly three decades.

“Sawai Nala - Muzaffarabad 30 km from LoC, key LeT training facility”

Sawai Nala was hidden deep, about 30 kilometers from the Line of Control. The enemy thought the distance and the rugged mountains made them untouchable. We hauled our heavy assets up the unmapped ridges in pitch darkness just to get a clear shot. When the command came, we unleashed absolute fury from above. The steep mountain walls couldn't shield them from the wrath we rained down. Through our night-vision scopes, we watched their entire stronghold turn into a raging inferno. We proved that no matter how deep they hide, our reach is longer.

“Syedna Bilal - Muzaffarabad JeM staging area with weapons, explosives training”

Syedna Bilal was a factory of death, used to train recruits in heavy weapons and explosives. We took aim in total silence, our hearts pumping with pure offensive intent. When we opened fire, our attack was so rapid and relentless, it caught them completely off guard. Our rounds struck, triggering massive secondary explosions. The entire hillside lit up like daylight as their own weapons cooked off. We didn't just disrupt their training; we obliterated their entire existence in that sector.

“Kotli Abbas - 13 km from LoC, nerve centre for training of LeT suicide bombers”

We knew exactly what was at stake at Kotli Abbas, located 13 kilometers from the LoC. It was the absolute nerve centre for training Lashkar fidayeen - suicide bombers being prepared to cross over and strike our homeland. The onslaught we delivered was sudden, violent and unyielding. The sudden rain of destruction caught them completely exposed. We eliminated the threat entirely, stopping those cowards right in their tracks before they could ever touch our soil.

“Kotli Gulpur - LeT terrorists operating Base”

Kotli Gulpur was sitting 30 kilometers back from the LoC. It was the beating heart of their logistics, supplying terror cells across the region. We maintained a brutal, rhythmic offensive, methodically hammering their communication lines, fuel stores and infrastructure. The continuous thumping of our strike didn't stop until the entire compound was reduced to ruins. We sent a clear message: if you support terror, we will dismantle you piece by piece.

“Bhimber - Training centre for IEDS”

Bhimber was a critical threat just 9 kilometers from the LoC. For a reinforced concrete fortress like that, we brought the hammer down with maximum violence. We synchronized our strike so that a massive volume of explosive power slammed into the facility at the exact same second. The ground shook violently beneath our feet. The sheer, crushing impact flattened the target fine dust. The bomb threat from Bhimber ceased to exist.

“Mehmona Joya - Hizbul Mujahideen camp”

Mehmona Joya sat 12 kilometers behind the International Border, operating as a long-standing sanctuary for Hizbul Mujahideen. We were positioned well back, channeling our collective aggression through precise coordinates. The roar was deafening as we slammed high-explosive fury into their grid, working at a relentless, furious pace. By the time the dust settled, Hizbul’s regional infrastructure was nothing but a smoking, cratered wasteland.”

“Sarjal – Terrorist training camp”

For my men, the strike on Sarjal was deeply personal. Located just 6 kilometers from the International Border, this fortified launchpad harbored the specific terrorist cell behind the cowardly killing of four of our brave police personnel. They thought their reinforced bunkers and underground tunnels made them safe, but we shattered that illusion with an intense, concentrated storm of righteous fury. The massive concussive force collapsed their shelters, burying them under the rubble.

“The Night We Held the Sky”

On the night of 07/08 May 2025, deployed in the Creek Area, Nb Sub Pushpraj Prasad Mishra’s Air Defence section went on the highest alert after major enemy losses across the border. A hostile UAS was detected approaching from across the border; once confirmed as enemy, orders were given to engage. With upgraded AD guns, the target was acquired, tracked and destroyed within moments. Swift, precise and controlled.

“Fire and Resolve”

On 08 May 2025 at 0330 hours, Gdr Javed Khan at Forward Post, came under intense enemy mortar and machine-gun fire. Directing accurate and concentrated mortar fire, he neutralised enemy positions before executing coordinated fire missions over successive nights, delivering more than 260 rounds with real-time correction of fire with quadcopter. The integration of surveillance technology proved decisive throughout the operation.

“Crushing the Enemy's Hate”

On the night of 08/09 May 2025, in a high-altitude sector, Hav Bendang Nukshi led his section against well-entrenched enemy positions dominating the area of responsibility. Advancing under continuous observation and enemy fire, he moved ahead of his men to direct accurate counter-fire from an exposed forward position. Enemy posts were neutralised and abandoned, strengthening the overall operational posture.

On the night of 08/09 May 2025, as three hostile drones closed in on the Corps Headquarters at 2115 hours, Capt Sudhir Kumar repositioned his Air Defence Gun Troop and took direct control of the gun. Destroying two drones in rapid succession, he forced the third drone to retreat, safeguarding a critical asset - a quiet display of duty fulfilled.

On the night of 08/09 May 2025, at Nangi Tekri, Sub Giriraj Singh commanded a mortar position under relentless enemy counter-bombardment. His leadership inspired confidence and ensured his detachment operated with precision and discipline, upholding the finest traditions of the Indian Army under grave danger.

“The Fire Assault of Pargwal: Decimating the Launchpad”

On 09 May 2025 at 2155 hours, along the Chenab River, Maj Sahil Sharma, SM, led his company in a crushing offensive against enemy launchpads at Pak Island, Pak Gitti, Kaliyal and Tariq. Under the code “AGNI VARSHA,” his troops unleashed precise mortar and machine-gun fire that decimated hostile positions and forced enemy to abandon their post. By 10 May, all four posts were destroyed with heavy adversary casualties while own troops suffered no losses.

On 09/10 May 2025, RHM (AIG) Ankur directed precision strikes on the Sawai Nala and Syedna Bilal terrorist camps. On the night of 09/10 May 2025 at 2330 hours, amid heavy mortar and artillery fire, Sub Rajinder Kumar crossed 800 metres of exposed ground under sustained shelling to reinforce his forward troops. Upon arrival, reorganising defences and directing coordinated fire, he ensured the destruction of an enemy thermal surveillance tower, degrading hostile targeting capability and forcing enemy forces to abandon their positions.
