LCH PRACHAND

The Prachand, also known as the Light Combat Helicopter (LCH), is an indigenously developed cutting edge multirole light attack helicopter. The Prachand was formally inducted into the Indian Armed Forces in October 2022 and has since been an integral part of the Indian Army Aviation Corps.

KEY FEATURES

- High-Altitude Performance: Can operate at over 21,000 feet.
- Stealth Features: Low radar signature and reduced infrared signature.
- Advanced Avionics:
 - Glass cockpit with multi-function displays (MFDs)
 - Helmet-mounted display and targeting system
- Armor Protection: Armored cockpit to protect pilots from small arms fire and shrapnel.
- Versatility: Can perform air-to-air combat, ground attack, counter-insurgency, escort missions and disaster relief operations.

TECHNICAL DETAILS

- Powered by twin Shakti engines.
- Maximum output of 1,383 SHP per engine.
- Service ceiling 6,500 meters.
- Maximum cruising speed 270km/h.
- Weapons
 - 20mm turreted gun.
 - Air-to-air and air-to-ground missiles.
 - 70 mm Rockets.
- Stealth & Protection Reduced radar signature, crash-resistant structure armor protection, missile approaching warning systems, flares dispenser and infrared suppression systems for self-protection.

Role in Indian Army

The Prachand is designed for a diverse range of combat and reconnaissance missions, offering unmatched versatility and adaptability in highaltitude and adverse conditions. A game changer, having the capability of successfully executing Combat and Strike Missions with precise accuracy, it has operated seamlessly in extreme altitudes, including the Siachen Glacier and Eastern Ladakh, where its high-altitude capability proved vital for safeguarding our borders and thus achieving military dominance.

Make in India: The LCH Prachand is a major boost to India's Make in India initiative, showcasing the country's growing capability in indigenous defence manufacturing. Developed by Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL), the LCH is the world's first attack helicopter designed specifically for high-altitude warfare. The LCH program has created employment opportunities, boosted R&D, and opened doors for potential exports, making it a symbol of India's push towards defence self-sufficiency under Aatmanirbhar Bharat.


BATTLE OF GANGASAGAR:

1971

angasagar is located approximately four km South of Akhaura and was a key place providing the link between Kasba and Akhaura and also held the key to capture Akhaura. Also from Gangasagar, the road Brahmanbaria-Comilia could be also threatened. 14 Guards was tasked for capture of Gangasagar by 4 Corps.

Gangasagar Complex comprised of Gangasagar Railway Station, Mogra, Gangasagar, Goal Gangail and Triangle Area. Pak Army was holding this area with elements of 12 Frontier Force and 12 Azad Kashmir who were in well fortified positions, with approximately two Companies plus strength. The enemy position at Gangasagar Railway Station was on a higher ground being along the railway line. The position was strategically chosen as it had no covered approach leading to it since the surrounding areas were marshy and had low-lying fields.

14 GUARDS was positioned south of Gangasagar. Initial recce of the objective concluded that there is no unguarded approach to the objective. Considering attacking from the east seemed to be the only option. During one of his final recce, Lt Col Channa, VSM, Commanding Officer 14 GUARDS spotted some people moving a rail maintenance cart on the railway track. It dawned on the Commanding





officer that the narrow path along the railway track can be used to mount an attack. He decided to assault using this novel tactics of advancing in a file formation and attacking on the objective. This sort of an assault remains unique in the documented history of war throughout the world.

After over five hrs of approach march, the Battalion reached at Majhigachcha (Miniand). Since the battalion had moved cross country and even the higher formation wasn't aware of its location, absolute surprise had been maintained. The Commanding Officer keeping the long march to the objective in mind had kept a floating H Hr for attack between 0400 hrs and 0600 hrs. He decided to launch the attack straightaway without wasting any time and thus the attack was launched at 0400h on 03 Dec 1971. The first bullet was fired at 0416 hrs and was ensued by a five and half hours long assault. A and B companies, moving in a file formation along the railway track, remained undetected for majority of their advance and attacked the Gagasagar Railway Station. C company attacked the hamlet of Goal Gangail and D company attacked from the North. In spite of heavy enemy shelling and bombardment by air, enemy's attempt to defend the Gangasagar complex proved futile and the fortress-like Defended locality fell by 1000h, 03 Dec 1971.

As a result of the fall of Gangasagar Complex, enemy move on road Comilla-Brahmanbari ceased. Ultimately, he was even forced to vacate strongly fortified position at Ujaisar. The legend of the fierce Fourteen's juggernaut grew on the enemy psyche in such magnitude that the enemy vacated Akhaura without fighting seeing that his Southern and SW flanks were completely exposed.

In this action, the Battalion lost 10 of its valiant soldiers. The enemy left behind 25 dead, 6 prisoners of war and a huge cache of arms and ammunition. For this gallant action, the unit was awarded with one "PARAM VIR CHAKRA" (Posthumous), one "VIR CHAKRA", four "SENA MEDALS", and one Bar to "VISHISHT SEVA MEDAL". It is recognised that it was solely the bold and unorthodox plan executed relentlessly which routed the enemy. The battalion efforts were recognised and it was later bestowed with the 'Battle Honour of Gangasagar'.

BANNED APPS
