






TECHNOLOGY ABSORPTION

Modernisation & technology infusion is one of the pillars under **Decade of Transformation** initiative of Indian army. Aligned with the same initiative, HQ ARTRAC embarked upon a mission to infuse technology in training by nominating 14 Cat A Establishments to evolve as Centres of Expertise (CsoE).

To enhance pace of Technology absorption, 33 technologies have been assigned to these nominated CsoE. ARTRAC has formulated comprehensive guidelines for technology absorption. Based on the guidelines, a long term plan, extending upto 2030, has been formulated which defines the technologies to be adopted, infrastructure to be created, HR upskilling as well as financial outlay.






First batch of Officer Cadets (Women) joined the Indian Military Academy, Dehradun for a rigorous one year training alongside their male counterparts in July 2025.








President Droupadi Murmu interacted with a group of Veer Naris and widows of fallen soldiers at Rashtrapati Bhawan.

ADVANCED TOWED ARTILLERY GUN SYSTEM

India's Advanced Towed Artillery Gun System (ATAGS) is a powerful 155mm, 52-calibre howitzer developed indigenously and is a significant leap towards self reliance. A collaborative effort between DRDO, Bharat Forge and Tata Advanced Systems. ATAGS stands out not only for its indigenous developments but for its cutting edge features that out perform most of its contemporaries in term of range, precision and performance.

Calibre: 155 mm, 52 calibres.

Range: Up to 45 km.

Weight: 19.5 tonnes.

Rate of Fire: 5-6 rounds/min (burst)

Crew: 6-8 personnel.

- Advanced fire control system with thermal imaging.

ROLE IN INDIAN ARMY

ATAGS is designed for high performance across varied terrains—from deserts to mountains. Its long range, accuracy and quick deployment make it vital for modern warfare. The induction of state of art ATAGS is a major step towards modernization through mediumisation of Indian Artillery.

BATTLE OF KHALRA (3/4 DECEMBER 1971)

December 1971, 14 JAK RIF was given the responsibility of defence of Khalra and important bridges over it. The township of Khalra, located on the eastern bank of the Upper Bari Doab Canal (UBDC), was a critical tactical node on the Lahore - Bhikiwind - Harike axis, guarding the gateway to Harike Head works and the Grand Trunk Road. In the opening hours of the 1971 Iindo - Pak War, the Pakistani forces launched a determined offensive to seize Khalra and break through towards Harike.

14 JAK RIF held firm against waves of assaults from 3-17 December, amidst relentless artillery, small arms fire and enemy infiltration. The battalion's defences were centered around Khalra and the key bridge spanning the UBDC. Civilians fleeing from Pakistani shelling inadvertently provided cover for enemy troops who then tried to storm the bridge.


On the night of 03/04 December, Lance Havildar Raghbir Singh, commanding a section tasked with the close protection of Khalra bridge, displayed exceptional bravery & courage. Under intense shelling and close quarter battle, he moved trench-to-trench, directing fire and motivating his men with unwavering courage. As Pakistani troops tried to overrun the bridge, he led from the front resolute and fearless.

Even as the enemy pressure intensified and the order to demolish the bridge was awaited, Lance Havildar Raghbir Singh stood his ground, fighting trench to trench encouraging his men and directing their fire to beat back the enemy assault.

As the enemy pressure mounted, he blew Khalra bridge at 0435 Hrs on 04 Dec 1971, taking en small arm fire on his body. In this act of supreme gallantry, he was fatally hit by a burst of MMG fire at close range, laying down his life in the finest

traditions of the Indian Army.

His valiant stand prevented the enemy from capturing the bridge intact, thwarting their offensive momentum. His sacrifice was pivotal in preserving the integrity of Khalra defences and set the tone for the battalion's resolute stand throughout the war. For his exceptional bravery, leadership under fire and supreme sacrifice, Lance Havildar Raghbir Singh was awarded the Vir Chakra (Posthumous).

REVISION OF AGIF SCHEMES

Enhancement of Insurance Cover for Regular Army & Territorial Army. AGIF is a compulsory Group Insurance cum saving scheme incorporated to fulfill the objectives of providing life insurance cover to Army personnel against all risks including war/ warlike situations, during service and lump sum maturity benefits at the time of retirement/ release/ discharge to facilitate theor financial well-being. The monthly subscriptions comprise of Risk Element and Savings. The nuances of present insurance cover effective wef 01 Apr 2025 are as under :-
